




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## The Pinwheel Geese Quilt Block Pattern

You need 4 fabrics ranging from light to dark.





## **Cutting Chart:**

Begin by making your Flying Geese units. (Make four of each color, for a total of 12 FG units.) This cutting chart gives measurements to make Flying Geese using the quick corner method (sometimes call the Stitch and Flip Method). For instructions, see the Scissortail Quilting website page on <u>Flying Geese Units</u>.

Once your geese are made, arrange your geese as shown in the diagram above. Sew a stack of three geese together paying careful attention to color placement. Repeat to make four stacks. Next, sew the large rectangle to the left side of each goose stack. Finally, sew each of these units together like a four-patch, again paying careful attention to the placement and direction of each stack.
