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## Anvil Quilt Block Pattern



## You will need 3 fabrics ranging in value from light to dark.



Use the chart below to determine what size to cut your patchwork pieces. For example, if you want a 6" block, you would use the measurements given in the highlighted column below. The chart may also indicate that some of your squares may need to be subcut either once or twice on the diagonal.

## REMEMBER:

Even when you're "finished" making the block, we call it an "unfinished" block until it is sewn into a quilt.

## Cutting Chart:

## Block Construction:

NOTE: For all seams, you should use a scant $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ seam and a 2.0 mm stitch length. Your unfinished block should measure 1/2" more than the finished size you are making. (i.e. For a 6" finished block, your block should measure 6.5")

Arrange your patches as shown in the diagram at right. Note the gold brackets that indicate the block rows.

First sew all HST (Half Square Triangle) units together to make squares, pressing to the dark side. Sew the first row of units together to make row 1. Similarly, sew the row 3 units together. For row 2, first sew the two pairs of HST units together and attach to each side of your large square, taking special note of how the units are turned. Finally, sew all three rows together.
